Essential steps in protecting a trafficked person


Prompt and accurate identification of the victim Provision of safe shelter, ensuring a full recovery (physical, emotional and psychological)

Safe, timely and voluntary return / repatriation

Ensure successful / positive reintegration


Objective: to provide safe and secure accommodation and related social support for individuals identified as having been victims of trafficking.


